COUNCIL INTERVENTION

Trans Canada Pipeline

Mayor Keeley attended a supper held by the group to gather information on their perspective concerning the Trans Canada Pipeline project. The municipality's conditions were communicated to the group: the protection of our resources and potable water among others.

Meeting with Minister Soucy

Mayor Keeley explains a meeting he had with the Minister on miscellaneous issues. Minister Soucy was advised that the Town's priority for roads remains the replacement of the Little River Bridge.

Regional collaboration - cost sharing

The Town met with the regional representative for LSD's in order to start the discussion on cost sharing. The Town's suggestion remains a contribution of 3¢ in taxes. This amount is based on the present agreement with the village of Drummond.

Mayor Keeley discusses the article printed in the Info-Weekend paper indicating that Grand Falls has adopted a firm position concerning the amount of the contribution requested. The Mayor reads the letter written to the Saint-André Rural Community which states that Grand Falls "suggests" the amount of 3¢ and reiterates that this amount is based on the existing agreement with Drummond.

He explains that the protection of Grand Falls citizens is a responsibility of Council. Citizens are 100% responsible for the maintenance of roads and public safety services, recreation and others while outside town limits, the Province pays for streets and subsidizes policing etc. Our small municipal population must pay for all these services while our sports infrastructure is used at 42% by individuals from outside town limits.

<u>Saint-Georges reservoir</u> – garbage

Council requests that signs be posted and that the police be present to stop kids from littering near the reservoir.

Sports Hall of Fame – induction

Free tickets are available if groups or associations wish to attend the ceremony.
